CATALOGING AND METADATA

■ **Advanced eCourse / Cataloging for Non-Catalogers***

DR. MARY BOLIN

This 12-week eCourse teaches the fundamental concepts and practices of library cataloging, including basic descriptive and subject cataloging concepts, the creation and management of cataloging processes and workflows, the shared cataloging environment, and trends in bibliographic control that will affect libraries in the near future.

■ **Cataloging Music Resources in RDA: Resource Description and Access**

DR. SONIA ARCHER-CAPUZZO

This eCourse explores the unique challenges of cataloging music resources and provides you with a strong foundation in music cataloging with RDA that you can use more confidently and successfully, no matter what type of resources you wish to describe.

■ **Cataloging with RDA: Resource Description and Access**

In this eCourse, RDA expert Magda El-Sherbini will get you started with hands-on RDA training that focuses on print monographs and will cover both description and access.

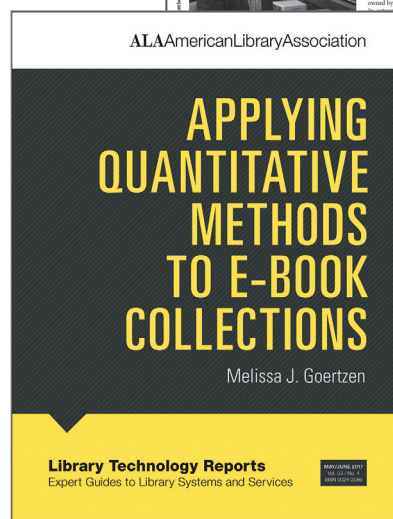
